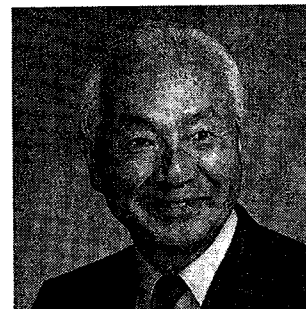

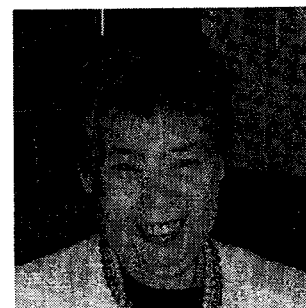

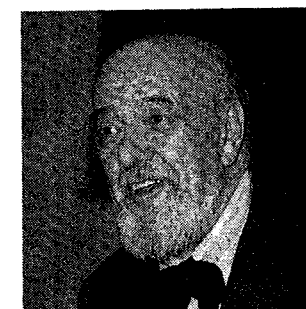

KAGEYAMA Atsushi (John) - Visiting Scholar, College of Business Administration, U. of Oregon. B.A. (1949), M.A. (1953), Doshisha U.; MBA, U. of Oregon (1958). 1955 Fulbrighter to U. of Oregon. During his career at Matsushita Electric, Kageyama, as president of American Kotobuki Electronics, was actively involved in business and educational programs throughout the community including directorships of the Japan-American Society of Oregon, Linter Center for Advanced Education, Columbia Business Community for the Arts, Pacific University Foundation, and the World Affairs Council of Oregon. He has been recognized for his contributions by the city of Vancouver, the World Affairs Council of Oregon, and the Vancouver Rotary Club.

The judges selected Mr. Kageyama for the Fulbright Prize because he is representative of the Japanese businessman in the U.S. who promotes mutual understanding between Japan and the U.S. through active participation in his local community.

KUMAHIRA Hajime - President, Kumahira Seisaku-Jo, Hiroshima. B.A. Faculty of Law, U. of Tokyo (1950). Beginning with 10 scholarships in 1984, Kumahira, through the Kumahira Scholarship Association has been awarding grants of ¥50,000 to about 50 students from Asia each year who are studying in the Hiroshima area for a total of 401 till 1992. In addition, Kumahira sponsors a symposium each year where students can express their views on Japan's internationalization. Kumahira is a trustee of the Foundation of Social Education Association, the Hiroshima Family Court, executive director of the Japan Federation of Employers' Association, and chairman of the Japan Safe, Furniture Cooperative Union.

The judges selected Mr. Kumahira for the Fulbright Prize because he is representative of the businessman at the local level who practices the Fulbright spirit through his financial and other assistance to foreign students.

ONO Harumi - Retired Medical Doctor, Tokyo. College Physician, Shirayuri Women's U. and Minato-ku Mitate Day Nursery. M.D., Tokyo Women's Medical College, 1948. Was a 1950-51 GARIOA grantee to Bellevue University Hospital, N.Y. Until her retirement in 1989, she specialized in pediatrics at the Tokyo Metropolitan Police Hospital for 40 years. From the early days of the program, Ono assisted many American grantees regarding their health and medical concerns in an unofficial capacity and participated in the orientation programs for Japanese Fulbrighters about to embark for the U.S. She is a board member of the International Medical Society of Japan and former president (1974) of the Medical Women's International Association. She has engaged in numerous activities such as conducting inoculation clinics for children, editing medical journals, translating medical and other articles into Japanese and English, and teaching English to nurses and doctors.

The judges selected Dr. Ono for the Fulbright Prize because she epitomizes the "unsung heroine" who, through her professional and personal activities, has promoted mutual understanding at a very personal level.

Cassandra A. PYLE - Executive Director, Council for the International Exchange of Scholars (CIES), Washington, D.C., B.A. political science, U. of Colorado (1957). Pyle has been involved with the Fulbright program in many capacities beginning in 1958 at the Institute for International Education (IIE), at the University of Chicago where she worked on foreign admissions, study abroad, and foreign faculty (1961-1974), returning to IIE as Area Director for South America (1974-77), then as IIE Vice President for Fellowship Services (1977-1981). She has been Executive Director of the CIES since 1981. Pyle has served on numerous committees and boards in the international field including the Council on Foreign Relations, U.S. National Commission for UNESCO, president of the National Association for Foreign Student Affairs, and the Liaison Group for International Educational Exchange. She received double honors in 1991 from her alma mater which awarded her both the Board of Regents Distinguished Service Award and the alumni association's Distinguished Achievement Award.

The judges selected Ms. Pyle for the Fulbright Prize because as a "professional among professionals" she is respected and admired by grantees and colleagues throughout the world for the warmth and humanity she has brought to her official responsibilities.

Philip (Eugene) WILLIAMS - Professor, Nagoya Gakuin University. B.A., Eng. Lit., Franklin and Marshall College, M. of Div., Yale U. (1950), S.T.M., lit. and rel., Columbia U.-Union Theological Seminary (1956), Ph.D. U. of Pennsylvania (1964). Beginning with the Occupation, Williams has spent more than 40 years in Japan contributing in numerous capacities - as a university professor, church leader, writer, translator, and volunteer - to promoting better understanding between Japanese and Americans together with his co-worker, Mrs. Williams. His work has extended far beyond his home in Sendai and encompasses not only his own fields but also assistance to professors in medicine, engineering and metallurgy to translate their work for wider dispersion. He has served on the board of directors of Tohoku Gakuin U., as editor of *Japan Christian Quarterly*, and as vice-president of the English poetry society of Japan among others. He has authored 13 books in both languages and more than 50 articles in various journals.

The judges selected Prof. Williams for his long and varied contributions to promoting mutual understanding between Japan and the U.S. which has earned him wide admiration and respect from his Japanese colleagues and friends.
